We have adopted this well-loved text as your invitation to worship on Sunday, August 19, 10:30 a.m. **ALL of our faith community will be in the sanctuary for one service.** Gathered 'Round, we will sing favorite hymns of faith, experience a children's story, recognize Bible Study teachers from this past year, and hear a word by Perry Dixon, Highland's Associate Pastor to Youth and Their Families. **Our regular Sunday worship schedule of 8:30, 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. services will not be held on this one Sunday, August 19. Also, there will be no Bible study classes, nursery, or Worship Care for children so we can all experience worship together.** Children's books and other child-friendly activities will be available in the Commons for our youngest children accompanied by a family member, should you need space to move about more freely.



Following worship, the doors will open and everyone will be invited to picnic on the church's green-spaces either by packing a lunch for yourself or your family or purchase lunch from "Boo Boos Smoke Shack Food Truck". They'll be serving BBQ, sides and drinks right on our lawn. *Is there a rain plan?* We're working on that—more information coming soon!

Our Wednesday evening programming begins a new year on August 22, and we are ready for the sounds of children busy with play—a child's way of learning new skills, connecting with their peers, and learning of God's love through music and activities.

- **Gathering Time** ALL of our Wednesday night children build community by singing together for 5-7 minutes before going to their graded choir activities.

Liminal Wonderings ...

Years ago, during the recession, I stopped at a Tumbleweed in Brooks, KY, for lunch. Only one booth was occupied, and the manager seated me in the next booth. Four men spoke loudly about something political. One asked the others if they had seen what some elected official had done. His question caught my attention because it wasn't true. Another said, "Well, if he did that then he is going to do..." and made up something that they all agreed was bad.

I recall that moment because I, too, am tempted to take short cuts in discourse. I, too often, think I know what someone will say or do and fail to give someone the opportunity to speak for themselves. Demonizing someone with opposing or different views is so easy. Loving those with different views is hard work and costs us comfort.

Truly listening requires a holding of our own convictions with open hands and minds. In my years as a chaplain, I learned that everyone had something to teach me if I would listen. There is so much that hurts people. We call these things evil. The question is "how do I expose evil without creating more evil, more polarization, more us vs. them thinking"? For me, this begins when I leave open the possibility of new understandings and relationships, when I check myself on my tendencies to judge and demonize. I have to ask myself, "Do I only love people who agree with me?" Life is easier that way, but that is not discipleship.

Looking Forward to a New Year!

In the coming weeks, we look forward to the start of school, our children promoting to new classes here at church, the return of Wednesday evening activities, a transition of teachers and teaching assistants in various children's classrooms and a new rhythm of activities outside of our regular Sunday/Wednesday programming for you to connect with others in children and family ministry here at Highland. Here are some important pieces of information to make note of:

- * **Fall Transition Includes Promotion of Twenty Children from Preschool to Kindergarten**—A significant transition will take place in the lives of 20 kindergarten children as they begin elementary school this fall! At church, transitioning from preschool ministry to elementary children's ministry also brings shifts to Sunday morning rhythms. The most significant transition is that these children are invited to become full participants in worship with their families, where they experience God through the gathering of community, witnessing baptism and baby dedications, participating in Communion and congregational singing. On Promotion Sunday, these new worshipers will be gifted with a Bible as we mark this important moment in the life of their faith journey. Other moments of transition for these children and their families will include a Kindergarten parent breakfast marking the transition, promotion to a new Bible study class at the hour their parents attend Bible study and participating in elementary children's choirs.
- * **Promotion Sunday, August 26**—For some the school year has already begun, and for others, it will begin in just a few weeks! On Sunday, August 26, Highland ushers in the new school year with Promotion Sunday. On this date, children will move to new classes based on their age/grade for the coming year. Please watch for more information that will be sent to you soon that will outline the classes that your child will be moving to this fall. If you have any questions, please contact Renee Purtlebaugh.
- * **A Note about Worship Care Schedules**—Please note that our current Worship Care rotation schedules continue through September 16. The new schedules for the coming year will begin on Sunday, September 23. Please make plans to trade with someone if you will be away, as our structure on Sunday mornings relies on your presence to function effectively.

My Faith Story: Deacon Testimony by Doris Hornbuckle

My faith story – where to start?

When my grandmother rode the bus from St. Matthews to the west end to walk my sister and me to the local church and enroll us in Sunday School? Or when I was in the youth group with my future husband, and being taught in Sunday School by my future mother-in-law?

But, I'll fast forward a few years. Church has always been a part of both Richard's and my life—growing up and then throughout our marriage.

Early in our married life, Richard was ordained. The routine was that with the laying on of hands, only ordained ministers and deacons could participate and of course lots of 'men' lined the aisles to participate while the 'ladies' were encouraged to sit quietly and pray. That was a challenge for me even then, and I remember thinking 'If God ever calls me to be a deacon, I hope I'm in a church that allows it'.

At one point I began to feel that call, but it would be some years before we found Highland, a church that would embrace it.

We've been members here for 28 years and I've been blessed to serve as a deacon at least 3 times, maybe 4. My first time was during Jim England's first time as our Interim Pastor. At that time, the Deacons were transitioning from being the old time "Board of Decision Makers" to one of "Care-Giving" and being an extension of the ministry staff. One of the biggest blessings for me has been being a part of the pastoral care group within the deacon body. I think caring for one another is one of the most important things we can do as part of a church family and whether it be a note, a phone call, or a visit, there are always lots of opportunities and needs among our congregation.

I've been blessed in many ways throughout my years at Highland and like all of you, I see this coming year as a time for prayer, discernment and coming together to seek the direction God has in store for us.

I am grateful and look forward to being a part of the process as a deacon. I thank you for the opportunity.

My Faith Story: Deacon Testimony by Joey Eubank

I am 70 years old. It is hard to get your life and spiritual journey condensed into 3 minutes, but I will try...so hold on...

My favorite Bible verse these days is 2 Corinthians 12:9: "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." I was born in Atlanta, GA, and raised, after the age of 8, in Greenville, SC. I have one sibling, a sister who still lives in Greenville with her family. From my earliest memories, I felt that I was God's child and God loved me. I don't know how I got that notion. My grandmother, Ethel, could have somehow instilled in me that idea. Both sets of grandparents were strong Baptists. My parents were not religious and rarely went to church. Maybe naively, I believed the song, "Jesus Loves Me." I guess I didn't hear the sermon "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God." My mother was mentally ill and in and out of mental hospitals during my early years. I barely knew her. My father could not care for two daughters and work, so my sister and I were placed in a children's home for all of our teenage years. But you know... God was there teaching me life lessons I would not have had otherwise. "My grace is sufficient for you..." After graduating from Winthrop College, I married a Southern Seminary, who pastored churches in NC for 8 years. During that time, we had 2 daughters, Jenny and Cortney, who fortunately live and work here in Louisville. The best thing we ever did as a family was join Highland Baptist Church. After many family problems, I experienced divorce. It was a very difficult time for my family, but my Highland Church family was a wonderful support. Paul Duke, who was our pastor at the time, gave sermons that were spiritual surgery with healing every Sunday. Raising two daughters as a divorced mother was difficult, but God was there in the faces of wonderful neighbors and my friends at Highland Baptist Church. "My grace is sufficient for you..." I worked as Director of HomeCare at ElderServe for 18 years and retired in 2012. God was there in the faces and life stories of the senior adults, colleagues, and HomeCare workers I worked with all those years. "My grace is sufficient for you..."

After twenty years of singlehood and raising my daughters, I married, in this sacred space, a long-time member of Highland, Procter Eubank. I was two weeks shy of my 60th birthday. (See... there is hope for some of you out there!) Our courtship is a whole other story, but in the deal, I got two more daughters, and best of all, three grandchildren! Procter has been my rock and a great blessing in my life. We both are now enjoying retirement: volunteering, exercising at the YMCA, traveling some, gardening, cooking, enjoying time with family and friends, and babysitting our grandchildren. God is there! "My grace is sufficient for you..." Thank you for electing me to serve.
