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
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Gather 'Round—Worship This Sunday, August 19

We have adopted this well-loved text as your invitation to worship on Sunday, August 19, 10:30 a.m. **ALL of our faith community will be in the sanctuary for one service.** Gathered 'Round, we will sing favorite hymns of faith, experience a children's story, recognize Bible Study teachers from this past year, and hear a word by Perry Dixon, Highland's Associate Pastor to Youth and Their Families. A drawing of our stained-glass window in the baptistry will be included in the worship bulletin for those who might want to color while listening. **Our regular Sunday worship schedule of 8:30, 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. services will not be held on this one Sunday, August 19. Also, there will be no Bible study classes, nursery, or Worship Care for children so we can all experience worship together.** Children's books and other child-friendly activities will be available in the Commons for our youngest children accompanied by a family member, should you need space to move about more freely.

Following worship, the doors will open and everyone will be invited to picnic on the church's greenspaces either by packing a lunch for yourself or your family or purchasing lunch from "Boo Boos Smoke Shack" Food Truck. They'll be serving BBQ, sides and drinks right on our lawn. We're holding out hope for a beautiful weather day—please come and join us!

Liminal Wonderings ...

School is starting. No surprise there. I find myself thinking about teachers I had in church when I was a young teenager. A silver haired ex-prize fighter became our teacher shortly after his wife died. He was 72. I do not remember a single word he said in class. I do remember that he often wept while he tried to teach us. We did not think him unmanly for this. We were aware of how awful the pain was and what it took for him to agree to try to teach us. We did not, perhaps could not, use words very well. Yet, in some way, we sensed that he genuinely cared about us.
Class was disrupted when another boy came. He often ran the streets and had a lousy home life. Our teacher cared about him too; much to our jealous dismay. This boy fell out of a tree and broke his neck. He lived a few weeks and died. Our teacher went every day to see him at the hospital. Our teacher wept in class after the boy's funeral.
I think about this man whose words I cannot recall, but who taught us compassion with his very life. I think about the impact of one life upon another. I think about those who teach our classes at Highland and I am grateful. ~ Jim England

My Faith Story: Deacon Testimony by Suzanne Busse

The first service I ever attended at Highland wasn't in this lovely sanctuary, but in a crowded room on the top floor. It was a Friday night in the summer of 2005. I was in awe of the members, the music, the minister, and the message! And, although I belonged to another church, I kept returning to that service, then to Sunday mornings until I felt a peaceful urgency to join Highland nine months later.

I was born in Rhinbeck, New York, a tiny town in the Hudson Valley. As an infant, I was baptized in a congregationalist church, whose members several centuries earlier would be called Puritans! My dad was transferred to Lexington in 1957 when they built the big IBM plant. A number of our rural neighbors attended Mt. Horeb, a tiny Presbyterian church on Iron Works Pike, so our family began an active membership there. I still remember my mom's joy when she became a deacon, I believe only the second female to be ordained!

Through her efforts and research, my mom also helped me to get a scholarship to attend a Presbyterian college in Tennessee. There, at Maryville, I grew socially (I was a very quiet gal) and spiritually. One of my favorite classes was "Man's Search for Meaning," taught by a professor who would later teach at the seminary here.

In 1972, I moved to Louisville, for my first teaching job in Bullitt County. A few years later, I married a man who was raised as a strict Catholic. During our 25 years together, I grew in appreciation of the many peace and social justice issues embraced by the church.

My thirteen years at Highland have blessed me in ways I cannot enumerate! The Generations Bible Study Class is a wonderful and supportive group! My previous term as a deacon has challenged me to tackle even what makes me confused or uncomfortable. And the services and lessons have filled in my many broken places.

I will close by reading a first draft I wrote in March at the Women's Retreat, so creatively lead by Carol Harston. It focuses on a personal struggle, but if I cannot share it with this church body, where can I share it? In re-reading it, I'm reminded of words by Richard Rohr: "We're already in the presence of God. What's absent is awareness."

The storms have been infrequent but full of bluster and damage. Comfort has seemed elusive, but in retrospect, I know it was always there. Flowing from multiple springs. But, now, when loneliness creeps in, covering my shoulders like a ragged shawl, I can throw it off! I can play with Lucie, Davis, Sonia, and Nora. Their energy and joy renews me. I can link arms and voices with my friends. Their insights redirect me. I can serve the needy around me, for as I give, they see cracks of light. Their smiles restore me. And God's direction restores me. I can push aside all my senses and be still. And in that stillness, I meet my God again. The path becomes less rocky. The landscape blooms. The wind clears the air; yesterday is gone. I have today. Wow!

My Faith Story: Deacon Testimony by Steven Michael Carr

I grew up in the Southern Baptist Tradition while simultaneously knowing that I was gay since I was about five years old. What I'm trying to tell you is that I desperately need a therapist. Libby Cunningham, call me.

My Faith Journey is such that I've always tried to make up for the fact that I was gay. Like if I was well-behaved enough. If I got good grades. If I joined all the clubs at school and made the honor roll and made my bed and got scholarships and made something for myself and if I prayed hard enough...those feelings that I felt--that I didn't want to feel—they'd go away. And they didn't. And that led to a lot of time in my life where I didn't really like myself very much. I grew up in a world where I constantly heard from my friends and my family that this thing about me...that I tried to phase out...was evil. They didn't know they were talking about me. I knew they were talking about me.

And so, I went off to college, where I met lots of people who didn't live life the way I did. Who thought things that were different from my thoughts. I met people who weren't white. And I finally just couldn't keep up the charade anymore. I couldn't keep existing and hating myself the way I did. And so I gave up on a judgmental God who only saves through substitutionary atonement.

But having been a religious person my entire life, it just didn't fit into my purview to be non-spiritual. So I looked for that fulfillment elsewhere. I spent a year studying Hinduism. And Buddhism. I studied Wicca. I tried to find some other source of spiritual fulfillment.

If you're looking for a Prodigal-son style story where I learn that those things are wicked and then I come "home" to the Baptist tradition...this is not the story for you. If anything, those journeys brought me closer to God than ever before, and I am thankful that I had that time to wander and discover what worked for me. God was with me in all of those spaces.

It took me years to even feel comfortable calling myself a Christian, let alone a Baptist. And yet somehow, I ended up here, with you people. And the same thing that destroyed my soul—Baptist Church—is the same thing that built it back up.

You took me in. You told me I wasn't sick. That I wasn't evil. It took me several years to be okay with calling myself a Christian again, but you didn't force me. You nurtured me. You showed me kindness.

And now it's time I paid that kindness back to you. Thank you for seeing something in me, for naming it, and for allowing me to be my full self at church.

I wonder, if I may...could we just...clap for that?

Thank you. That's the first time I've ever heard clapping in this room in ten years of attendance. We should do it more often.



My Faith Story: Deacon Testimony by John Pacyga

Hello, my name is John. I am the grandson of an alcoholic...

Most people want to know about my other grandfather. He fought in a big war, had medals, and then was given a coin that was hung in a plaque on his wall. He was the one that many considered the Hero, but my other grandpa fought in a silent war and was a silent hero. My other grandfather had a serenity coin that he carried on him all the time. That grandfather made one positive choice and then many more choices on the road to sobriety. He found Peace with God, then Peace with the people around him, and most importantly, Peace with himself. He repaired the relationships with his family over many years. He made a fresh start in a new community and started a new job. He worked long and steady on life. He was more than 20 years sober and the second half of his life was better than the first half. After a long life, he was surrounded by his family. I say all this to give you all hope for your journey.

Because of both of my grandfathers, I grew up in a good home. I accepted Jesus into my life at a young age and grew in my faith from family and giving friends. I was baptized as an adult in this church. And now my kids are growing up in this church and learning so much from the great teachers and ministers.

I have a long way to go on my journey. Though I will be serving as a deacon, that doesn't mean I'm perfect or have all the answers.
