Pastor Search Committee Leads Congregational Conversation Sunday, January 26

The Pastor Search Committee invites the congregation to attend a Congregational Conversation during one of our two Bible study hours (9:30 or 11:00 a.m.) in Fellowship Hall on Sunday, January 26. The purpose of the time together will be to discuss the events and schedule of how the candidate for Highland's next pastor will be presented and voted on during a call weekend. We recognize that many people may not have grown up Baptist or may not have experienced a call weekend since Highland had its last call weekend for a pastor nearly 23 years ago. All are encouraged to attend so that the congregation can be ready for a call weekend sometime later this spring (date yet to be announced).

From 2019 I carry a profound sense of gratitude for Highland Baptist Church. Diana Butler Bass in her book, Grateful: The Subversive Practice of Giving Thanks, wrote "gratitude is an emotion, a complex set of feelings involving appreciation, humility, wonder, and interdependence." She says that ultimately gratitude is about connection. As I look back over 2019 and 2018, gratitude is what I feel for you.

I have been witness to painful loss within our fellowship and seen how you pull together providing meals, preparing space, supporting each other and creating services of remembrance so that the losses are shared.

I have been witness to your faithful attendance and giving. Easier to coast during an interim. You have not. Rather you stepped up. I see you building that interdependence that Butler Bass suggests. You keep the community of faith vital.

I have been witness to a staff—their leadership, compassion and gifts. I see them seeking education while being pastoral in their ministry groups. I love how they lead. I love how they collaborate.

I am grateful. I could name so much more. However, I have a different point I want to make. As we focus on who will be coming as pastor, what that one will be like, and how grateful we will be to finish their interim time, I want to tell that person what a special church they are coming to. I am grateful for the future that is coming, the one you have already begun.

Interim Update The Pastor Search Committee has narrowed the field of candidates to our final four. We are checking with a Corner second round of references and will also be visiting the candidates in their current places of ministry in the coming weeks. We appreciate your ongoing prayers as we near the presentation of our recommendation for our next pastor.
